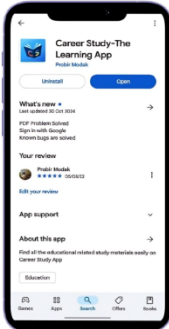

Answer: After Harsha's death in 647 CE, his empire began to experience a gradual **decline** due to a combination of **political**, **military**, and **social** factors.

- **Lack of Strong Successors:**

Harsha's death left a power vacuum in his empire. His **sons** were either too young or ineffective to maintain the vast empire he had built. Harsha's central authority weakened, and his empire was divided into smaller territories, with many regions falling into the hands of **local rulers**.

- **Invasions by Foreign Powers:**

After Harsha's death, his empire faced invasions by **Hunas** and other nomadic tribes from the northwest. These invasions destabilized the northern territories, leading to the eventual disintegration of Harsha's once-powerful empire.

- **Internal Struggles and Fragmentation:**

Following Harsha's death, the different provinces and regions of the empire began to assert their independence. Local rulers and powerful vassals began to challenge the central authority, and the unity Harsha had established started to dissolve. The loss of **central control** over distant provinces contributed significantly to the weakening of his empire.

- **Cultural Decline:**

With the decline of the political structure, the **patronage of the arts** and **religion** also diminished. The period following Harsha's death saw a decrease in **cultural activities** and the decline of **Buddhism** in many parts of northern India, though it continued to thrive in regions like **Bengal** and **Gujarat**.

Thus, the decline of Harsha's empire after his death was largely due to the lack of a capable successor, external invasions, and internal fragmentation, which led to the eventual disintegration of the once-prosperous empire.
